12-020: History Program Change remove HIST 332: History of Southern Africa from World Area – course has not been taught for 8 years. Remove HIST 344: 19th Century Europe and HIST 352: Tudor Stuart England from the European Area. Material in 344 is covered in other classes. 352 has not been offered for a number of years.

12-021: HIST 332: History of Southern Africa – suspend course – has not been offered for years

12-022: HIST 344: 19th Century Europe suspend course – content is found in other courses

3. CDC Curriculum Proposals

11-538 CS 235 Java Programming

Existing prerequisites (CIS 230 or CS 131) have been suspended. Proposing CS 112 as the only prerequisite. Object oriented programming is first introduced in this course. CS 112 has prereq of CS 111 (it has prereq of MATH 115 or Math code 50 or 65).

11-510 MATH 351: Introduction to Numerical Thought COURSE CHANGE

The pre-requisites for MATH 351, "Introduction to Numerical Thought," a 4 unit course for Mathematics majors, needs to be updated. Currently, CS 131 is listed as a pre-requisite; however, this course no longer exists. CS 111 has replaced it in the Computer Science department and the Math department notes this as an acceptable replacement.

Action: Recommend Approval [Chris]

11-511: MATH 240: Introduction to Mathmatical Thought COURSE CHANGE

The pre-requisites for MATH 240, "Introduction to Mathematical Thought," have proven to be inadequate according to the Math Department. Currently, Calculus 1 (MATH 105, MATH 106, or MATH 109), is the only pre-requisite. MATH 110, "Calculus 2", will better prepare students for MATH 240. The pre-requisite for MATH 110 is MATH 109 or a completed Calculus 1 course (MATH 105 or MATH 106); therefore, students must complete 2 semesters of calculus prior to taking MATH 240. Both MATH 109 (and MATH 105/106) and MATH 110 are offered in the spring and fall, as is MATH 240; therefore, the additional pre-requisite should not hinder availability to students.

11-456 MUS 312 Musicianship COURSE CHANGE

MUS 312 and MUS 313 (see proposal 11-457), "Musicianship", will be deleted and their content will be moved into a new course: MUS 322, "Music in the K–8 Classroom" (see proposal 11-458). Both courses are C-4 as is the new proposed course. Both courses are 2 units each, whereas MUS 322 is 3 units. These courses are primary for the Liberal Studies Elementary Education Program and are required for the major. The reduction in 1 unit total is desirable for the major. Chris Hopper, Associate Dean of CPS, in a written letter strongly supports the Music Department's proposal.

Action: Recommend Approval

11-457 MUS 313 Mucisianship COURSE CHANGE

MUS 313 and MUS 312 (see proposal 11-456), "Musicianship", will be deleted and their content will be moved into a new course: MUS 322, "Music in the K–8 Classroom" (see proposal 11-458). Both courses are C-4 as is the new proposed course. Both courses are 2 units each, whereas MUS 322 is 3 units. These courses are primary for the Liberal Studies Elementary Education Program and are required for the major. The reduction in 1 unit total is desirable for the major. Chris Hopper, Associate Dean of CPS, in a written letter strongly supports the Music Department's proposal.

Action: Recommend Approval [Chris]

11-458 MUS 322 Music in the K-8 Classroom NEW COURSE PROPOSAL

MUS 322, "Music in the K–8 Classroom" will replace the content of MUS 312 and MUS 313, "Musicianship", both of which will be deleted. This course prepares pre-service teachers for general music lessons in the elementary school classroom and is intended primarily for LSEE majors. There are no prerequisites for this course and will reduce the LSEE major by 1 unit. MUS 322 will be offered every semester and is C-4 status. A detailed syllabus is included in the proposal with all of the appropriate SLOs, Music Department goals and outcomes, assignments, exams, and projects. Chris Hopper, Associate Dean of CPS, in a written letter strongly supports the Music Department's proposal.

Action: Recommend Approval [Chris]

11-148 SPAN 207 Spanish Level IV COURSE CHANGE PROPSAL

The department wants to have this course designated as meeting DCG-Non-Domestic requirements. After conversations with the department, the CDC came to appreciate that language teaching was now more than rote memorization and that culture and issues of diversity were integral to the course. To help reinforce this vision, the department would like to change the course name to SPAN 207 Spanish Language & Culture IV. Additionally they would like to change the course description to more clearly reflect the pedagogy in use: "Intermediate Spanish II; develop understanding, speaking, reading, writing, knowledge of Hispanic Culture. Language as a communicative medium/carrier of culture. Conducted in Spanish. Part 2 of a 2 course sequence." As a side note, the existing coreq of SPAN 110 will change to reflect the recent changes in the language labs.

11-419 SPAN 108S Level I Heritage Speakers COURSE CHANGE PROPSAL

The department wants to have this course designated as meeting DCG-Non-Domestic requirements. See below

11-420 SPAN 208S Level IV Heritage Speakers COURSE CHANGE PROPSAL

The department wants to have this course designated as meeting DCG-Non-Domestic requirements. As noted under 11-148, the department has sufficiently explained how the way language is taught serves to meet the DCG requirements. In addition, these courses (SPAN 108S and SPAN 208S) particularly serve that purpose as their goal is to ensure that people who already speak Spanish understand the differing cultural norms, particularly in a professional setting, between Spanish and Anglo culture.

4. DCG and Institutions Discussion

11-379 NAS 200 The Indian in American History Course Change Form.

Proposal to change course to American Institutions status. Course has been petitioned for Institutions status numerous times in past and accepted. NAS feels the course meets institutions requirements as laid out in executive order and wants to formalize this. Syllabus and discussion with NAS faculty have convinced CDC that the course will meet demands of Institutions. However, CDC expressed concern about having a course that would triple count for Area D, DCG and Institutions. NAS has agreed to remove DCG status for this course, since their majors take plenty of DCG courses as is. CDC was in agreement with this approach.

Email from Scott - 9/25

Here are the catalog requirements. Looks like we already do have a policy that these cannot double count.

"Students may meet the DCG requirement with courses that simultaneously meet other degree requirements (general education, the major or minor, US Government, or the elective component)."

"Though the American Institutions requirement is separate from General Education, one lower division course can count in Lower Division GE Area D. One upper division course can count in Upper Division GE Area D."

Note that in the first paragraph, history is left out while U.S. Government is not. So, the confusing way to read this policy is that students could take NAS 200 either as an institutions course OR a DCG, but not both, since that class would potentially have both designations. However, since they are willing to drop the DCG, then I read this to mean that once they are an institutions course, it cannot count for DCG.

So, I think the problem may be solved already by policy.

Does make me wonder why this language does not apply to U.S. Government though.

Email from Jená - 9/25

To me, that statement actually opens the door – I don't interpret the parenthetical as being comprehensive. The relevant statement is "with courses that simultaneously meet other degree requirements," and Institutions is another degree requirement.

Email from Christina Accamando (to Anne Paulet)

The Dean told me that there is an actual policy that courses satisfying the history part of the Institutions requirement are not allowed to also carry DCG status. And we are fine with that change - our students will be getting plenty of DCG anyway, and not everything has to triple count.

So - I would hope that, with the Department's consent and the Dean's instruction, the proposal could move forward with that friendly amendment to remove DCG status once NAS 200 has Institutions credit.
